SWEDEN AND FINLAND ASK NATO TO CONSIDER THEIR ADMISSION QUICKLY

# CAN NATO EXPECT TWO NEW MEMBERS?

Moving past Russia's invasion on Ukraine lies the potential of two more countries seeking NATO membership which, coincidentally, also shares a border with Russia. Finland and Sweden, part of Northern Europe, have voiced consideration for joining NATO, but is it worth it? I'll say yes.

First off, Sweden and Finland are two countries who have continuously worked with NATO, they might as well be non-members in name only. And I'm not talking about political relationships only, they have numerous close interactions through military exercises and international missions. The military exercise worth pointing out is the Trident Juncture, a NATO-led military exercise for an Article 5 scenario. Ironically, if Russia attacks Finland or Sweden when they are admitted to NATO, they're facing two nations that are already trained to fight with NATO as a whole. That's a different kind of military experience for Finland, who already fought Russia during their invasion in WWII. Finland and Sweden are also part of the UK Joint Expeditionary Force, a military alliance that besides Finland and Sweden, all the nations involved are NATO. Seems kind of interesting that the two nations haven't joined already at this point.

Another reason, that some may think to be obvious, is the possibility that Russia may invade Finland or the Baltic Sea, which allows access to both Finland and Sweden. The Baltic Sea is a vital region of ocean that reaches to almost all of Northern Europe and possession of it, if possible, can lead to dominant control of the countries exposed by it. Sweden has already reported multiple airspace violations by Russia before and a possible submarine appearance. Sweden took this seriously, as expected, and re-occupied an island in the Baltic Sea that provides a strategic military position when crossing the sea. Finland is in the same situation with Ukraine, having a border with Russia and also has a border with Sweden so Sweden has something else to worry about if an invasion occurs.

Something that many people may overlook is that NATO would most likely want Finland and Sweden to join them as well. As Finland borders with Russia, if they were to join NATO, they would extend their existing border against Russia. It also fills up a crucial gap in the defense in Northern Europe, which compared to NATO is overwhelmed by Russian forces. Although Turkey has expressed opposition towards Finland's and Sweden's admission, it is most likely not going to end with NATO rejecting the two nations.

There are worries that Russia may attempt an invasion against Finland to prevent them joining NATO as well as invade the Baltic Sea to attack Sweden since they are already doing it to Ukraine. Although the possibility exists, based on Russia's performance against Ukraine, I don't think we need to worry too much. What could happen to prevent such an attack is that Finland and Sweden get accepted fast enough so that Russia can't plan an attack in time. NATO's Article 5 states that if one of the members is attacked, it is treated as an attack to all members. I'm sure Russia would not pick that kind of fight. If Russia launched an invasion in time, then they would face both the UK and Britain as they have signed security pacts to prepare for any aggressive actions. So Finland and Russia can have some breathing room as they make their consideration and hopefully have it permanently if they are admitted.

The two nations should not be alone when an unpredictable Russia decides to move troops to their border for a "military exercise". If it had to be one or the other, they're better off joining the side that has continuously proved to be able to cooperate and maintain a long, friendly relationship, that being NATO. With the Russian-Ukraine conflict still being updated on the news, I believe that the prospect of Sweden and Finland joining NATO would be great news to me and that it should definitely happen.

# REMOTE LEARNING: A DETERIORATION OF A STUDENT'S PERFORMANCE?

WHEN THE PANDEMIC FORCED SCHOOLS TO GO REMOTE, STUDENTS AND TEACHERS ALIKE REALIZED HOW DIFFICULT IT IS TO ATTEND SCHOOL AT HOME.

April 3, Chicago - A loud ringing of the alarm started the junior's (requested to be anonymous) day as usual during the weekdays. It rang for about 3 seconds until he rose up and turned off the alarm, laying back in bed afterwards. The morning sun lit up the room as he finally resolved himself to get off the bed. It was the same routine every school morning: get dressed, brush his teeth, and scroll through YouTube while eating breakfast. However, he didn't get ready to leave the house, nor did he even need to. He went on the desktop computer and got on a google meet to see his teacher greeting the rest of the class, with everyone behind a camera. The junior gave a heavy sigh as he thought about staring at a screen for hours again. This was how almost every student in CPS started their morning during the school year of 2020-21, when the COVID-19 pandemic caused schools to transfer to remote learning. Due to the rapid spread of COVID-19, Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot announced on Aug. 5 that CPS will be going fully remote for fall 2020. Due to the hesitant decision to go remote, many systems and processes were made hastily and various problems were expected to occur. Some of these problems impacted a lot of students at home, such as poor internet service or lack of a private room. Teachers also shared such problems, causing canceled classes or having substitute teachers who were unaware of what the classwork was.

"Being at a home environment does not give students the ability to have a professional mindset", He says as sounds can be heard from the living television. Many students lack an isolated room or have other responsibilities that have higher priority than class to them, such as helping their siblings or taking care of their pet. The junior had a teacher whose dog often came to the room to be with its owner and a student that would walk their dog during class if they weren't doing work that day. Children also made slight distractions or interruptions for the teachers during lectures or when explaining work.

Outside distractions weren't the only things that disrupted one's attention class. As many classes did not require students to turn on their camera, there were quite a number of opportunities that they had to slack off or in a way ditch classes by opening the google meet and just going on another tab or on their phone. The junior admitted to doing this as well stating, "Other than my AP classes, I was always doing something during class. Those things either took part of my attention or all of it."

One of the, if not the biggest, problems that affected the experience of remote learning was motivation. Many schools had their attendance decrease significantly since the start of the new school year and since students could just join the meet and leave the screen on, that number may have been much lower in reality. Grades were at their lowest for students, including those who typically maintained As and Bs. Their lack of motivation just couldn't let students put in the effort needed for the class. The most reported reason for their low motivation was that they had to stare at a screen for a long period of time and thus couldn't feel the same atmosphere as being in a real classroom. The fact that multiple students also didn't have their cameras on further enforced the idea of being isolated for students and the idea of talking to a wall for teachers. Mason shared his own experience with this struggle, "My motivation for school was at a all-time low during the remote learning." When asked how he would view another year of remote learning if the pandemic was still at large, he said it would be another horrible experience.

CHICAGO April 4th, 2022- The clock hit 4pm on Friday, March 11 when the videos began to surface on *Snapchat*. Most are blurry due to the user jumping around and their camera quality, but what is occurring is clear to all. Blood spills onto the concrete as cars try to pass by the ever growing rowdy crowd. Students are fighting again. But this time, two are being attacked by many. The entire situation raised questions about how administrators plan to deal with this, and deal with physical altercations in general.

Peter Affuant, the principal here at Mather High School, spoke about student altercations. The main question brought to his attention was how the school goes about punishing students who get into physical altercations with other students, both within and outside of school property. Mr. Affuant says, "We, first of all, make sure everyone is safe..." He does this by first using security to separate students from one another, and cool them down by speaking with them. By getting down to the reason of the altercation, staff is able to find a way to prevent it in the future.

The number of altercations here at Mather have seen a steady decline as the year progresses, with about 30 students having been in one. To put that in perspective, that's an entire classroom that has gotten into a fight this school year. According to the official CPS website, "suspensions continue to decline, with a 41 percent reduction in in-school suspensions and a 76 percent reduction in the rate of out-of-school suspensions since 2012".

Another thing that was mentioned is that It's the same students who keep getting into trouble. This being said, I inquired about the suspension process, seeing a solution to the recurring students causing trouble.

"There's actually a new process of suspension now. It needs to be approved by the board, which could take days." Affuant says. Despite the new system, and the requirement of approval, there has been a decrease in violent behavior, as it seems to be working. As many students wondered, 'why didn't they just suspend them', the process of de-escalation has been key in stopping violence at Mather. Its unclear as to whether or not this process applies to other CPS schools, but the student code of conduct for all CPS schools states "A student serving out-of-school suspension is not allowed to come onto school property, participate in extracurricular activities, or attend school-sponsored events. A student may be considered trespassing if he or she comes onto school grounds while suspended out of school".

A senior at Mather, Yahairi Sebastian says "Fights are entertaining, but we often forget that these people can get seriously injured, or even die".



## A CPS SCHOOL'S POLICY PROCESS

### HOW DO CPS SCHOOLS CREATE POLICIES AND IMPLEMENT THEM

On Jan, 18, CPS students from Various schools participated in a walkout in protest of the new COVID-19 Safety measures and student voice, only shining more light on the issue of student representation and student voice. Considering these school walkouts happening throughout the country, this adds to a serious discussion about student representation and what role they might be playing in their own learning and education.

As students are going into the school for the first time since the beginning of the pandemic, and with students still adjusting to being back in school, they walk into a school that implemented new policies and dress codes for the school year. With the school throughout the year implementing new policies that are meant to somewhat curb the increase in violent incidents in the school, but a question floats over everyone's mind: who really creates these policies, and what is the student's role in the entire process?

"Policies are typically developed if we find a gap in an area where more support is needed" Ms Lyons said. The school in the current year has put in place many policies such as regular screening when coming in, or the new 3 minute tardy rule. These types of rules were put in place to combat common issues the school is facing this year such as student attendance and a social media threat earlier this year.

"I think it depends on the policy we are talking about. There are policies that are decided by the Board of Education" Ms Lyons explains, "A school based policy might be one that is around dress code, although part of that is in the Code of Conduct as well", adding "If we are doing a school based policy, we typically try to involve all voices, students, staff, and parents".

Julie Lyons, an assistant principal at Mather High school, Prior to her time at Mather, she was a teacher at Amundsen high school and before that she worked in advertising. Her Involvement in the school's policies varies, she states "School based policies yes I do have a voice in them. But we split up responsibilities, so I might not be leading the crafting of the policy - it might be another staff member or administrator".

With a main question remaining: What role do the students play in those policies?, well according to Ms Lyons the answer was simple, "We utilize the Student Voice Committee to help contribute. We also have a student Climate and Culture team that we use as well.", later adding "we typically try to involve all voices, students, staff, and parents. We work together to develop something that we all think we will be able to uphold within the building".

"Policies are typically developed if we find a gap in an area where more support is needed." continuing "We implement different plans and then do a process check to find out what is working and what is not working, and if the policy is having its intended impact on what we were trying to do".

in recent years students have became more and more vocal about issue in the community whether it affects them or not, and with the issues facing schools from remote learning and pandemic, to violent threats and all sorts of school issues, students around the country, some might add the world, are not showing any sign of them staying silent.



CHICAGO-Another new morning, inside a small apartment another groan comes out, as the breathing evens out from the slow and deep to a rhythmic and steady. Too tired and sore to properly complain, he fumbles around to find his phone. As he checks the time, another muffled groan escapes his mouth, almost muffling his own complaint. It's 7:55 am, only 5 minutes left before the supposed "1st period" starts. After cursing whatever Gods, Devils, and Buddhas that he could remember for around one minute, he got up and got refreshed. Afterwards, he sat dazedly in front of a Chromebook screen afterwards for a couple of minutes before remembering the time, and started opening google classroom only to be once again "surprised" at seeing the instructions on the screen and not seeing a single person. On the presented screen, it read "say 'here' in chat for attendance, then you're free to leave and do the 3 reading assignments posted on google classroom. Don't forget to answer the questions." No human interaction, no faces, no noise, no nothing. The identical cycle followed the rest of the day.

Schools went out of in-person learning right just when kids were starting to show excitement for spring break. As kids thought they were just getting more break time as they enjoyed themselves, they were given the news that they'll be going remote. Both children and adults were given false hope over and over again as they were told they'll start again soon again and again. That soon turned out to be a year and a half later. During that time, all those kids and adults lost their schedules, work ethic, social skills, mental stability, and most of all time. And when they came back to school, they were expected to have the skills to continue without ever having been through the 1 and half year gap. They were just supposed to be "normal" again.

"It was honestly depressing, the family was struggling with keeping their jobs, me and my siblings trying our hardest to adapt, and then the whole anxieties keeping us mentally strained." said Khan, a senior student at Stephen T. Mather High School. Khan's family had been struggling with the epidemic for a while due to them being fairly new to the US.

People all over the world share the same difficulties. Khan used to be a straight A student, but after finding out about the death of two of his uncles he had started to give up school work and grades to support his family. The epidemic took one thing that could help him in the building of his future, which was the grades he cherished once. After that he fell off the radar. Some counselors tried to contact him, but after the first three meetings he gave up on the rest as well, because he found out that talking through the screen about life doesn't help with life's problems.



Similarly, when schools finally restarted students were quite happy. But after the first two weeks, they found out that nothing had changed. Although the school was accommodating the students' adjustment to school pretty well, the students found it a bit too hard to get used to. One student had this to say, "They really expected us to come to school, and get back to school life as if this was just another school year. They acted like we didn't lose a whole year to a sickness, and we didn't change at all during this time. It was kinda cruel and unkind. A lot of people expected some more sympathy." said Aaron. This was a sentiment shared by more than half of the student body. Aaron was someone who suffered from chronic back pain due to a genetic condition that ran in his family. He lost two household members due to the virus. This was still a huge change to him. His whole family was still adjusting and he was putting on a strong front for his family to help them. He was emotionally and mentally exhausted. When the school year started, he expected to get some time to rest and build himself back up, to finally have some to allow himself to grieve. But the school had a different agenda.

Everyone had suffered and was expecting more from a system that they all agreed was broken. The people in school might have cared for them, but the system did not allow them too much movement. It was hard to make the known lines any blurrier, teachers were given goals of what every student should know and they didn't have many choices. While people were just trying to recover from their suffering, school was there like a tyrant expecting its people to work and expecting nothing less.

Students felt like their pain was not listened to. Teachers were a bit better than students since they were in the building half a year before the students. One teacher said, "It was indeed a tough time for many. It was hard to see so many kids with potential that you saw a year ago lose that flame that pushed them forward. It left a bitter aftertaste."

### THE RIGHT TO PRIVACY, WHAT DO WE REALLY HAVE?

How students are impacted by their lack of privacy and HIPAA rights.

Want to make your own health decisions, because your parents don't approve, well too bad!

A high school student's right to privacy has often been misconstrued by staff, parents, and other authorities all over our nation. Although a student should have the right to privacy in regards to their medical records, especially once they turn 18, this doesn't always seem to be the case.

Once a child turns 18, they are protected by HIPAA (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act), which protects an individual's medical records and health information. However, most schools aren't required to follow HIPAA guidelines. This can put a student at risk if their parents disapprove of the health decisions, like getting the COVID-19 vaccines without their knowledge.

If a school nurse or clerk informs a parent of their child's vaccination status when the parent is anti-vaxx, this may cause a lot of unnecessary tension between the child and parent.

This very same situation occurred with a friend of mine. After receiving her 2nd dose of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccination, she was experiencing the side effects such as headache, body pain, mild fever, and overall fatigue and decided to go to the school nurse. When talking to the school nurse and attendance coordinator, she mentions that her mother is very anti-vax, she's one of those types to believe that the vaccine has a microchip in it and that the government is tracking you with it.

My friend hints that the nurse and attendance coordinator should not tell her mother that she was feeling unwell due to her 2nd dose. The nurse and coordinator do just the opposite and tell her mom that she was experiencing these side effects because of the vaccine, not just the 1st dose, but her 2nd dose.

There are many students out there in similar situations like my friend, when a parent and child have conflicting views on politics, science, religion, and medicine, this can cause a lot of stress within a family. With my friend, upon her mother finding out that she had received the vaccine against her wishes, made it clear that she wasn't happy about this. This can impact a student's mental health negatively, and possibly put their safety at risk.

All this fuss for what? At 18, you are legally allowed to make your own health decisions, and HIPAA applies to you as a patient in a healthcare setting. You need to provide written consent for your medical records to be viewed by anyone who isn't you or your doctor. Everything is confidential in the healthcare setting, and it should be the same in the school nurse's office.

School nurses are still healthcare professionals and they should be subject to HIPAA as well. And at 18 years of age, you're considered an adult in all 50 states. Why should your HIPAA and privacy rights be any different in high school?

Even if HIPAA doesn't apply to schools, the school staff should respect the student's requests to not share this information with their parents. This is especially important if this might pose a risk and cause tension between the child and their parents. The student knows what's best for them in their situation and the school should trust their judgment.

Of course, those on the other side may think "your parents have the right to know about their kids" and "well, high schoolers aren't able to make their own decisions", well I think that we know what's best for us as 18 year olds, legal adults who should have autonomy over our own body. We can do the needed research and use our prior knowledge to make the health decisions that we deem necessary.

What's the difference between a high school senior who's 18 and a college freshman who is also 18? Why are our privacy rights any different from theirs? Really my only piece of advice to those trying to resolve this issue is, just listen to us and treat us like the adults we are!

# THE AFTERMATH OF REMOTE LEARNING

The impact remote learning had on students and teachers across the nation.

At Mather High School's library, chemistry teacher Theresa Milz sits near the big picture windows overlooking the playground, tall trees, and green grass, on a nice, sunny day. The calm atmosphere of the library is filled with quiet students typing away on their Chromebooks, scribbling the answers to their homework, or just chatting with their friends. This setting is an apparent contrast to the chaotic, loud, and bustling hallways of Mather. Students and teachers often missed the chaos of their schools once the switch to remote learning took place in March of 2020. This lasted almost two years with schools reopening for the 2021-2022 academic school year in the fall.

Remote learning severely slowed down the amount of curriculum content covered throughout the 2020-2021 school year. 56% of teachers covered only half, or less than half, of the content that they would have gone through compared to past years. Only 1 out of 5 teachers said they were on the same schedule for the curriculum as years past. "I was really looking forward to teaching chemistry in person, not the same as teaching chemistry on a computer," says Mrs. Milz. Teachers have all the resources they need to teach efficiently and effectively in-person, rather than online and in their own homes.

Mrs. Milz explains, "Being worried about the world, society, and my relatives, that constant concern forced me to find as many things as I did to appreciate during that time. Otherwise, it would've just been overwhelmingly sad, I probably wouldn't have gotten anything done." Remote learning, only caused teachers and students to feel more unmotivated, stressed, and experienced major anxiety and depression due to the prolonged social isolation. They were also faced with other issues such as financial struggles, health concerns, family troubles, and mental health struggles, all of these factors becoming roadblocks to students' education and work for the teachers.

Remote learning also caused students and teachers to fall behind with the curriculum, feeling as if it wasn't a practical way to learn and educate. Instead of going through the trials and tribulations, a classroom setting provides when it comes to assignments and the curriculum, remote learning caused students to resort to looking up the answers and becoming afraid to make mistakes.

They prioritized getting the work done, rather than learning and working through the process. Even if kids tried their best to learn the process, didn't look up the answers, and actively participated, they didn't retain the information they learned as well compared to a classroom environment. As Mrs. Milz describes, "Students could basically hide, and not ever really have to put forth and take risks if they didn't want to...risk avoidance really hurt their education...Having an answer and having gotten an answer are two very different things."

Mather's administration attempted to show teachers and students as much support as they could with gifts, Ranger days, technology support, extracurricular virtual activities, and much more, but this didn't really change the fact that the majority of people just wanted to go back to school for the fall. Mather offered Chromebooks and CPS provided free internet access, but teaching on a computer may never be as effective and efficient as in-person learning. The classroom provides a purely academic-focused environment for students and teachers. Students can perform tasks such as making models, performing labs, group activities, etc. Teachers can provide immediate feedback around the classroom, and directly interact with students, something that cannot be achieved online.

Many students, teachers, and parents were pleased to hear that CPS schools were fully reopening for the 2021-2022 academic school year. There were still some concerns about COVID safety guidelines and another possible spike in cases. Oswaldo Grajeda, a senior at Mather comments, "My biggest concern was how would people be cautious of their health with others around them. I was afraid that people would lie about their health status in order to come to school and that students wouldn't wear their masks properly."

Despite these concerns, Mather and CPS had strict safety guidelines and regulations put in place. CPS kept the mask mandate in place longer than schools in the suburbs, encouraged COVID testing, vaccine clinics, social distancing, and quarantine for documented cases or exposures. Mather didn't see a huge spike in cases compared to other schools, which set a good precedent for the rest of the school year. It seems like Mather could continue in-person learning without any unforeseen closures.

"Coming back this fall wasn't weird at all, it was like a relief. You know like, ah, here it is again, here's school, here's the chaos, here's the 1,700 students walking around.", Mrs. Milz says. The majority of students and teachers felt the same way coming back to school this fall. Students have fewer distractions, they can concentrate better, and receive a more direct, personalized education from their teachers. Spending time with and being around classmates, peers, and co-workers after almost two years of isolation was a relief for many. Students were able to properly learn in the classroom, and teachers were able to teach inperson with all the necessary resources, providing a better education than remote learning ever can.


Students of all ages can now hope to enjoy the rest of their education, back in the building. Most students and staff can agree with Mrs. Milz saying, "I'm very happy to be back."

# MASK ARE NOW OPTIONAL FOR CHICAGO PUBLIC SCHOOL

CHICAGO PUBLIC SCHOOL MAKING MASK-OPTIONAL

Chicago Public School has made a decision to move to a mask-optional policy starting March 14. All Cps students and staff now can choose whether to wear masks or not since the Covid cases are decreasing. This decision has been great for some people but also has led to many disagreements for some students and teachers, which cautioned that the move violated a safety agreement.

The district stated on Monday that it will implement a mask-optional policy, in accordance with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's most recent recommendations. The school district recommended wearing masks when the Covid-19 cases and hospitalizations in their region are high.

Nowadays, a lot of students are fully vaccinated, so making masks optional is great, but also not so great at the same time, because moving to mask-optional would also undo progress and threaten the health and the safety of a large swath of unvaccinated students on the South and West Sides. About 30% of students aged 5 to 11 are fully vaccinated, while 57 percent have received at least one dose of the COVID vaccine. Approximately 56% of 12- to 17-year-olds are fully vaccinated, and 68% of students have gotten at least one dose. Students who are not vaccinated should continue to wear masks when going to school.

A High School Student named Thu Dang has argued that "I believe Chicago Public School makes masks optional because the number of people who tested positive is decreasing, but I don't think this is a great idea since the Covid is not completely over yet." "I think it is important for us to continue to wear masks because the Covid is still there, and we don't know when it will end. It might have a higher chance of people getting it again whether you are vaccinated or not, it still affects you, so for our safety, we should wear masks to protect ourselves from getting Covid."

However, the mask optional is now a choice. People can choose to wear it if they want to since it is not mandatory as it did when the pandemic started.


### PROM'22


